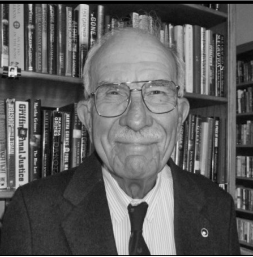

The December ACC meeting featured hearings on several cases involving excessive accumulations of debris and derelict vehicles. ACC Rules, pursuant to our CC&Rs, prohibit storage of inoperable vehicles on lots within the Association. This includes vehicles registered with the DMV under "non-op" status. This rule has been deemed necessary to avoid proliferation of junk vehicles within the community. Allowance can be made for special cases when members have definite plans to repair or restore vehicles within an acceptable time period. Also, the prohibition is not being enforced against vehicles stored inside a garage so as to be out of sight of neighbors.

As I mentioned last month, please don't try to burn wet leaves during a break in the rain, as this practice results in excessive smoke production.

IV. BOARD OF DIRECTOR'S MEETING MINUTES:

Emergency Preparedness Committee

Pre-Emergency Planning - Personal Preparedness
Water and Food
January 2015

Did you assemble your Emergency First Aid Kit last month?

Water and Food are essential to survival and you can’t count on others to provide for you in an emergency.

Task this month:

Prepare and store a 72 hour supply of Food and Water for each family member.

WATER

How Much:

You should store at least one gallon of water per person per day keeping in mind that heat or medical conditions may require twice that much per person.

How to Store:

To prepare safest and most reliable emergency supply of water, it is recommended you purchase commercially bottled water. Keep bottled water in its original container and do not open it until you need to use it. Observe the expiration or “use by” date.

If you purchase containers to fill, it is recommended you purchase food-grade water storage containers from surplus or camping supplies stores to use for water storage.

Before filling with water, thoroughly clean the containers with dishwashing soap and water, and rinse completely so there is no residual soap. Follow directions below on filling the container with water. If you choose to use your own storage containers, choose two-liter plastic soft drink bottles – not plastic jugs or cardboard containers that have had milk or fruit juice in them. Milk protein and fruit sugars cannot be adequately removed from these containers and provide an environment for bacterial growth when water is stored in them. Cardboard containers also leak easily and are not designed for long-term storage of liquids. Also, do not use glass containers, because they can break and are heavy.

When you store the water, use a sharpie to indicate the date it was stored.

Filling Water Containers:

Fill the bottle to the top with regular tap water. If the tap water has been commercially treated from a water utility with chlorine, you do not need to add anything else to the water to keep it clean. If the water you are using comes from a well or water source that is not treated with chlorine, add two drops of non-scented liquid household chlorine bleach to the water. Tightly close the container using the original cap. Be careful not to contaminate the cap by touching the inside of it with your finger. Place a date on the outside of the container so that you know when you filled it. Store in a cool, dark place. Replace the water every six months if not using commercially bottled water.

Water Purification:

If you need to purify water and do not have any purification tablets or are unable to boil water for 10 minutes, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and U.S. Department of Health and Human Services suggest the following:

Water	Bleach (if Water is Clear)	Bleach (if Water is Cloudy)
1 gallon	8 drops	16 drops
5 gallons	½ teaspoon	1 teaspoon
Use liquid chlorine bleach (5.25% hypochlorite). Wait 30 minutes before drinking.		

FOOD

Besides personal taste, the following are things to consider when putting together your food supplies:

- Avoid foods that will make you thirsty. Choose salt-free crackers, whole grain cereals, and canned foods with high liquid content.
- Stock canned foods, dry mixes, and other staples that do not require refrigeration, cooking, water, or special preparation.
You may already have many of these on hand. (Note: Be sure to include a manual can opener.)
- Include special dietary needs.
- Keep canned foods in a dry place where the temperature is cool.
- Store boxed food in tightly closed plastic or metal containers to protect from pests and to extend its shelf life.
- Throw out any canned good that becomes swollen, dented, or corroded.
- Use foods before they go bad, and replace them with fresh supplies.
- Place new items at the back of the storage area and older ones in the front.
- Change stored items every six months.
- Be sure to write the date you store it on all containers.

Public Safety Committee

The PSC’s first face to face meeting with Sheriff Honea went well. Several matters were discussed in detail with each having positive outcomes for the future of our homeowners associations.

Sheriff Honea began the meeting with the announcement of the implementation of the Reverse 911 Emergency Notification Program. This program will open communication between the Sheriff’s Office and our members in case of emergency (fire, flood, blizzard, etc). This communication link is intended to enable vital emergency information to be transmitted from the Sheriff’s Office to every member of the PPPOA via land line or cell phone. Ultimately , this program will be coordinated and linked to our Emergency Preparations Committee’s Facebook page and the PPPOA’s website with further details of interest to the safety of our membership (evacuation plans, emergency kits, phone numbers, etc). Seminars concerning the 911 Emergency Notification Program and other crime prevention issues will be issued through the Sheriff’s Office Crime Prevention Officer at the PPPOA Village sometime this Winter and will continue on a quarterly basis throughout the year.

I asked Sheriff Honea about the number of early release offenders occupying our area. Our Sheriff’s Office Chief responded and disclosed the number and classification of the early release probationary criminals we now have dwelling on the upper ridge. These individuals are classified in three groups beginning with those possessing the least offensive criminal histories and concluding with the personnel having the most offensive criminal histories. There are currently; 6 Alternative Custody Supervision criminals, 14 Post Release Community Supervised Probationary Parolees, and 13 Parolees from the State Prison System living between Magalia and Sterling City. This total of 33 probationary criminals is alarming and one of the paramount reasons Sheriff Honea and our committee agree on an increased police presence on the Upper Ridge.

Sheriff Honea also stated the PPPOA residents being vital to law enforcement in our area and the eyes and ears to his department. He continued, “If you see something wrong going on, report it to the Sheriff’s Office and expect a prompt, professional, and effective response with the complete anonymity being guaranteed to the reporting party”. I can attest this is no bold claim as I personally have been witness to a couple problems in my neighborhood which were resolved exactly in accord with Sheriff Honea’s statement.

Finally, I can say Sheriff Honea has been true to his word in providing a greater police presence on the Upper Ridge. We now have more Sheriff’s patrolling longer hours and making more busts in our precincts than ever before. This situation is not temporary and we all can look forward to enjoying a higher degree of safety via an ever increasing law enforcement capability in our neighborhoods.

It’s been a while since we wrote about the history of the sign, so I’m going to “borrow” from an article I wrote for the Nugget in January of 2011, for those of you that don’t know the beginning or as a reminder to the old timers that have been around for a while.

The County Supervisor , Fred Davis was very instrumental in helping us obtain all necessary permits. The MBA commissioned Gene Vogelpohl, a Magalia resident, to design, carve and install the sign. Gene also constructed the impressive stone columns. Gene’s wife, Cherri, helped with the original painting. The sign has been re-painted three times since installation by club members, Donna Herndon, Sharon Kvist, and Joyce Simmons. The planter box at the base of the sign was constructed by the California Conservation Corps, Dick Randlett, as well as its sister planter box at the Old Magalia Church sign. The corps member were invaluable helping with collecting rocks, soil and the actual placement of the large sign.

Over the years, the club has maintained the seasonal floral displays for both planters. The MBA is proud of having given Magalia this beautiful landmark and hope it will continue to welcome you home and greet visitors to our special place on the ridge.

This is because of the drought. We need moist soil to do good and lasting trails work. This year we believe we will have plenty of moist soil in which to work. So we will be hitting the trails hard this winter and spring. Our usual trails workday will be on Thursdays, however, if the weather is not good for a particular Thursday we will pick the day that will work best for weather. We normally start in the morning and work for about one-half day. We work as hard as we want and for as long as we want. Those who may be interested in working on the trails committee may send me an email at wadethms@aol.com. All levels of abilities are welcomed – we always have work that can be done by almost anyone. It's not a problem even if you think you will only be able to help occasionally. We will be starting regular workdays on Thursday, January 8. We have some tools that you can borrow for trails work. That said we find the following to be most useful – a McLeod fire-fighting tool, a set of hand clippers, a folding hand pruning saw and gloves. We have learned by experience that other tools that you might think would be helpful such as shovels and bow saws are almost useless.

The second item is that I would like to start a weekday walk group. This will introduce members to some of the easier trails to walk in the greenbelt. If you ever wanted to go on a walk in the greenbelt, but were afraid you might get lost or get too far out in the wilderness this group would be for you. This group would walk the easier trails that are relatively close to civilization. Everyone is welcome – including those who are regulars on our weekend hikes. I would like to start the walks in late winter or early spring. If you are interested send me an email at wadethms@aol.com. Around mid-February I will start contacting the group to set up a first meeting/walk.

Finally, this month we will be hiking on the first two Saturday's. On Saturday January 3 meet at 10:00 am at the end of Ponderosa Way. We will hike along a beautiful section of Middle Butte Creek. This section should be especially stunning with the rain that we are having this winter. Meet at 10:00 am at the end of Milton Court on Saturday January 10. We will hike down to Little Pearl for a look at the cascade and waterfall at this popular summer swimming hole. We hope to see the cascade and waterfall in a roaring state like we have not seen in several years.

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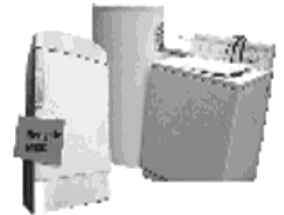

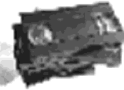


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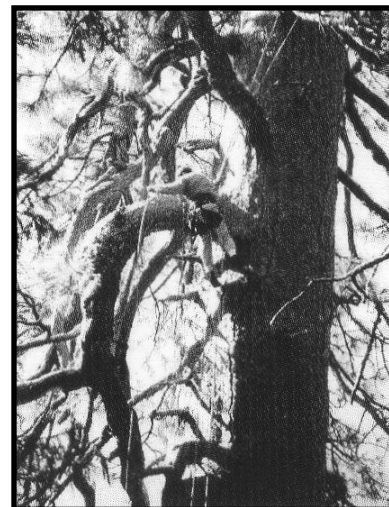
